Joan Charnley (1928 - 2016) was a prolific textile designer during the 50's and 60's. She passed away in 2016, leaving her house in Uppermill and all her artworks to her neighbours and friends Nigel Durkan and Julian Bovis.

During the renovations, they discovered a hidden hoard of Joan's artwork. These had not been seen for almost 70 years, and it's the same designs (and more) we're now delighted to offer as part of our wallcovering collection.

Nigel and Julian completed renovations on Joan's house in 2019, and following her wishes, they have created a contemporary gallery, showcasing new artists, supporting students and the local community. It's called The Weavers Factory.







Six years after World War II, the Festival of Britain took place to raise spirits and celebrate British Design. Joan travelled to London to show her designs to the leading textile houses of the day such as Liberty of London, Heal's and Sanderson & Sons. They deemed her as

“ **Too contemporary for the current market** **Not commercial enough** **Too experimental** ”

Joan left London disheartened, wrapped her designs up in leather portfolios and hid them under her desk. These designs weren't seen for another 67 years.







After retiring from full time teaching, Joan continued to work in her studio at home in Upperville. Not one for slowing down, she discovered a new interest in botanical illustration, and held regular exhibitions of her work.

After her husband Archie passed away, she took on further challenges and embarked on tours of the USA, India, Japan and Australia. She travelled across Europe, South America and celebrated her 80th birthday in the Galapagos Islands, with each adventure influencing her creative style.


Joan had become great friends with her neighbours Julian and Nigel. She called them 'the boys'. The sense of fun they shared is clear from stories about themed dinners in fancy dress, to playing scrabble (with prizes) to the simple pleasures of gardening and companionship.

Joan passed away in 2016 and following her wishes Julian and Nigel converted her home – a Grade II listed building – into a contemporary art space called The Weavers Factory.


